



## 2022 Senior Target Compound Team Selection

### 1. Purpose

---

This document serves as a Selection Addendum to Archery Canada's Compound National Team Selection Policy.

The purpose of this addendum is to select athletes to the Senior Target Compound National Team who will represent Canada at all World Archery (WA) Outdoor Target events in the 2022 season.

### 2. Eligibility Requirements for the 2022 Senior Compound National Team

---

Team selection will be made pursuant to Archery Canada's Compound National Team Selection Policy, as appropriate, and this Addendum. Eligibility requirements must be met as stated in the Selection Policy and this addendum.

### 3. Team Size

---

The number of archers to be selected for the Men's and Women's Senior National team is as follows:

- Men's Senior Team: 8
- Women's Senior Team: 8

### 4. Team Selection Process

---

#### 1. Automatic Selection

Any archer to medal (Top 3 final ranking) in an individual category at a WA World Cup or Place in the Top Eight (8) final ranking at a Senior World Archery Championships will automatically secure a spot for the 2022 Target team and hold the top placing regardless of position on the Archery Canada Ranking List. In the event that multiple archers in the same category meet the criteria for automatic selection, their 2022 Team Rank will be based on their final rank at the event in which they qualified.

## **2. Ranking**

The team will be selected based on the combined 2021 Senior and Junior Squad final rankings as of October 15, 2021.

The team will be made up of the top eight (8) ranked archers in both Men's and Women's combined Junior and Senior compound divisions that have a minimum ranking level of (**Men-3450, Women -3350**). Performance points will not be used for the 2022 ranking process due to Covid travel restrictions to events.

Archers must submit a minimum of five (5) eligible scores for submission which must be from a World Archery or Archery Canada Registered 720 Round or a "Recorded Round" 720. Please see the document appendix for details outlining the "Recorded Round".

Please note: Due to the ongoing impacts of COVID19 across Canada, Archery Canada holds the right to extend the recorded round submission deadline at any time as deemed necessary.

It is the archer's sole responsibility to ensure the scores are kept up to date. The prospective team will be announced **October 18, 2021**, archers will have until **November 1, 2021**, to appeal the selection.

The selected archers will represent Canada at World Archery, World Cup events and other potential events, with the top four (4) having priority. If one of the top four (4) archers chooses not to attend, available spots will go to the next ranked archer until the 8<sup>th</sup> position is exhausted, no other archers will be considered.

The selected archers will be required to sign the athlete's agreement for 2022, as well as complete and submit all appropriate athlete documentation to the Archery Canada office, at least 3 weeks before attending an event as a National Team member.

Archers will also be expected to produce a training schedule with a listing of tournaments they plan on attending for the 2022 season.

## 5. Performance

---

Selected archers will be expected to support the Archery Canada Championships as well as continue to be ranked for the 2022 season with that process started no later than May 30, 2022. Archers will be expected to achieve scores that they shot in the 2021 ranking list.

## 6. Removal or withdrawal from the team

---

Archers having not started the ranking process by May 30, 2022 may be removed from contention for the team.

Archers may also be removed from the 2022 Compound Team if they have not met the above performance guidelines without just cause and/or failure to sign the 2022 Athlete Agreement.

If an archer in contention for the team voluntarily withdraws their name from contention before the official selection date, the next archer on the ranking list, that meets the outlined criteria, will be eligible for selection.

If an archer in contention for the team voluntarily withdraws their name from the team, following official selection to the team, the Target/Field Coordinator can nominate the next ranked archer on the ranking list to the Archery Canada High Performance Committee. The Committee will determine if that archer meets selection requirements, as per the Compound Canadian Team Selection Policy and this addendum. If HPC finds the archer does meet the requirement, they will be able to move the nomination for approval by a Selection Approval Panel, as per section 4 & 5 of the Compound Canadian Team Selection Policy. This panel will consist of:

- 1 Archery Canada Board Member
- 1 Member of the High-Performance Committee
- 1 Neutral Party

## Appeals:

---

Selection for this team will be named by October 18, 2021

Archery Canada's Appeals Policy will guide any appeals related to the 2022 Compound National Team Selection. The policy can be found here:

If both parties agree, the Archery Canada Appeals Policy can be bypassed, and the matter can be brought immediately before the Sport Dispute Resolution Centre of Canada (SDRCC) who will then manage the appeals process.

Decision Making Authority: The decision-making authority for the 2022 Compound National Team includes the Compound Target Archery Coordinator and the Selection Approval Panel as laid out in Archery Canada's Selection Policy and this addendum.

## Appendix One: A 720 Recorded Round

---

Archery Canada understands that it may not be possible for archers to shoot scores in local events registered with Archery Canada because of regional COVID-19 restrictions. Due to various Provincial Restrictions and the inability to host an in-person trials, the establishment of an alternative score submission process has been implemented.

While we are encouraging participation where appropriate, Archers, the Designated Recorder and Clubs **must strictly adhere to their local Provincial and Federal Public Health Orders** and keep up to date as they continue to change.

- The "Recorded Round" will consist of 72 arrows shot at 50 metres for compound athletes and 70 metres (juniors & seniors) or 60 metres (cadets) for recurve athletes.
- The "Recorded Round" scores are not eligible for the AC Ranking list.
- Archery Canada rules will apply, except for rule 4.8.3.3. As a result, a "Recorded Round" can have as few as 1 archer or as many archers as the range can accommodate within Provincial Health Regulations.
- Recorded Rounds pertaining to this selection document must be submitted to Archery Canada via the linked registration form (see below) no later than July 31, 2021.
- Recorded Rounds must be submitted at least 48 hours prior to the time and date of the round.
- There must be a Designated Recorder (DR) in charge of the round, who meet one of the criteria listed below:
  - an NCCP trained archery coach
  - a certified archery judge (any level of certification)
  - an Archery Canada certified Range Safety Officer.
  - A member of Archery Canada, who is 18 or older.
- the DR is responsible for:
  - Submitting intent to host a Recorded Round to Archery Canada no later than 48 hours prior to the shoot and no later than July 31<sup>st</sup>, 2021, by registering online at:

Please note: Scores submitted through the recorded round registration process for selection to World Archery Championships and World Archery Youth Championships (Junior Category) will be automatically added to the 2021 ranking list.

- o Submit the score(s), and a photo of each archers' score card, signed by the archer and the DR, within 24 hours of the completion of the "Recorded Round" to the program coordinator. The score card must be legible, and the photo must be clear. Scores and Scorecards should be submitted to:

- o If there is only one (1) athlete shooting the "Recorded Round", either the judge or the DR will participate in scoring and will submit a photograph of the score and target face before arrows are pulled, after each end.
- o The "DR" must ensure that the range meets AC rules with accurate measurements and that target sizes and heights are correct.  
(Book 2, Chapter 7, 7.1.1.1 to 7.1.1.10 and 7.2.1 to 7.2.2.3).
- o Every effort should be made to have an AC judge at the event, although this may not be possible under local COVID rules and restrictions. If there is no AC judge, the DR is the judge and his/her decision is final.
- o If the DR has any questions, the DR may contact a judge for advice.
- "Recorded Rounds" can be shot on established ranges, practice ranges, or private property. **In all cases, the location must be compliant with the rules and safety regulations applicable to local bylaws and those of the Provincial/Territorial Association and Archery Canada. Archery Canada reserves the right to request an alternate location if it is not deemed acceptable under any of the preceding.**
- The "Recorded Round" must be shot according to the rules for the 720 Round as laid out in AC Rule Book 3 Chapters 11 to 14 with respect to Athlete's Equipment, Shooting, Timing and Scoring.
- Due to the ongoing impacts of COVID19 across Canada, Archery Canada holds the right to extend the recorded round submission deadline at any time as deemed necessary.
