



Youth Compound Selection Addendum 2022 Youth and Masters Pan American Championships

HALIFAX, CANADA MAY 30TH – JUNE 6TH 2022

1. Introduction

This document serves as a Selection Addendum to Archery Canada's Compound Canadian Team Selection Policy

The purpose of this Addendum is to define the event specific criteria used by Archery Canada to select the Youth Compound athletes, who will compete at the 2022 Youth and Masters Pan American Championships.

2. Eligibility Criteria

Team selection will be made pursuant to Archery Canada's Compound National Team Selection Policy, as appropriate, and this Addendum. Eligibility requirements must be met as stated in the Selection Policy and this Addendum.

To be eligible athletes must also meet the below age requirements:

- U18 Class (Cadet) -- archers must be born on or after January 1st, 2005.
- U21 Class (Junior) -- archers must be born on or after January 1st 2002.

3. Selection Authority

Under the guidance of the HPC, the Compound Program Coordinator is accountable to select athletes and staff, for participation at events, in accordance with the Compound Canadian Team Selection Policy and event specific criteria.

4. Selection Details

Selection Timeline

Selection for the 2022 Youth and Masters Pan American Championships will be made following the selection camp and no later than March 31st, 2022.

5. Team Size

The maximum number of youth compound archers Canada can enter in the event is four athletes per equipment division and age category as outlined below:

- Compound Cadet Female
- Compound Cadet Male
- Compound Junior Female
- Compound Junior Male

6. Discrepancies & Amendments

In the event of changes by World Archery (WA) to the selection and eligibility criteria, Archery Canada is bound by these changes and will review and amend this document to comply with the new regulations or conditions.

Archery Canada is carefully following the evolution of the coronavirus on the global and domestic level and how it may impact World Archery Events and/or domestic nomination of athletes to compete at these events. Unless otherwise required by exceptional and unforeseen circumstances related to the impact of the coronavirus, Archery Canada will respect this published Selection Addendum as written.

However, situations related to the coronavirus pandemic may arise that require this Selection Addendum to be modified. Any modifications will be made promptly and as often as required following developments that directly impact the Selection Addendum. In such circumstances,

any modifications will be communicated to all affected individuals as soon as possible. Further, situations may arise that do not allow this selection addendum to be modified or applied as written due to time constraints or other exceptional and unforeseen circumstances. In such situations, any decision, including nomination decisions, will be made by the individual(s) with decision-making authority, as stated in this selection addendum, in consultation with the relevant individual(s) or committee(s) (as applicable), and in accordance with the stated performance objectives and selection philosophy and approach as stated herein. Should it be necessary to make any decision in this manner, Archery Canada will communicate with all affected individuals as soon as possible.

7. Team Selection Procedure – Event Specific Criteria

Selection will be made based on athlete performances at a Defined Competition (“Selection Camp”) using the athletes Average Arrow Value (AAV). Archers must also demonstrate that they can achieve a minimum qualifying score (MQS)

a. Defined Competition

Performance will be measured across (2) performance indicators as follows:

1. Ranking Round AAV
2. Match Play AAV – Inclusive of both team and individual matches

Selection points are calculated as follows:

$$(\text{Ranking Round Arrow Average}) + (\text{Match Play Arrow Average}) = \text{Selection Points}$$

For AAV:

- Ranking Round: The AAV will be calculated by dividing the archers total score(s) in the designated rounds by the total number of arrows shot.
- Match Play: The Match Play AAV will be calculated by adding the value of all arrows shot by the archer in individual, team round and any designated drills, by the total number of arrows shot in the corresponding rounds.

b. Minimum Qualifying Score

To be nominated to the team archers must also demonstrate their ability to achieve an AAV equivalent to the top $\frac{3}{4}$ final ranking in their respective category at the 2019 World Archery Youth Championships (Madrid, Spain).

Category	MQS Score
Cadet Female	655
Cadet Male	675
Junior Female	659
Junior Male	677

Archers will have been considered to have demonstrated their ability to achieve the required score by either of the following:

- Having shot the required score 3 times during 2021 in either a registered 720 round or a formal Archery Canada recorded round.
- Achieving a total AAV in both the Ranking Round AAV and the Match Play AAV at the Selection Camp (equivalent to the MQS score).

Archery Canada reserves the right to nominate athletes that have not achieved the MQS score to complete a team for participation in either the team round or mixed team round competitions.

In the event there are more spots than eligible athletes following the selection camp, Archery Canada reserves the right to nominate athletes that have achieved the MQS score 3 times during 2021 in either a registered 720 round or a formal Archery Canada recorded round.

8. Participation in the Defined Competition – Selection Camp

Provincial and Territorial archery organizations (PTSO) may nominate up to eight (8) athletes to participate at the selection camp. Archery Canada will subsequently nominate additional athletes to participate at their discretion.

Archers may compete in the Selection Camp that are unlikely to achieve the MQS score provided they are nominated to do so by their PTSO or Archery Canada.

9. Funding for the Youth Pan American Championships

The funding level and costs associated to this event have not yet been confirmed. In addition to paying incidental costs, athletes should anticipate a levy up to the full cost of their participation in the event.
