### **2024 World Field Archery Championships**

This year marked the successful hosting of the 2024 Field Archery World Championships in Lac la Biche, Alberta. This event showcased the strength of Canadian archery and the tireless commitment of our community. Congratulations to Lakeland Archers and Rene Schaub for delivering another world-class competition that set a high standard for international events.

### **2025 World Archery Youth Championships**

We were also honoured to host the 2025 World Archery Youth Championships. While this was a vibrant and exciting event, it was significantly impacted by the Air Canada strike, which created unique challenges for athletes and organizers alike. Despite these hurdles, the competition highlighted the incredible resilience of our participants, volunteers, and hosting partners. Congratulations to all competitors for their outstanding performances.

### **High Performance Program Transition**

This year has been a period of transition for our High-Performance Program following the departure of our Head Coach. Our focus has shifted to coach development and capacity-building to ensure the long-term success of our athletes. ### **Compound Mixed Team Olympic Inclusion**

The announcement that Compound Mixed Team Archery will be added to the 2028 Los Angeles Olympic Games is an exciting milestone for our sport. Archery Canada is committed to strategic planning to support this discipline at the highest level.

#### **Governance Reform and Best Practices**

Archery Canada continues its work in governance reform, collaborating with our sport partners to align with current best practices. These efforts are vital to ensuring transparency, accountability, and sustainable growth as we move forward.

# Executive Director Report

The past fiscal year brought both challenges and progress for Archery Canada. Funding reductions from Own the Podium and the end of several federal grants for Safe Sport and DEI created significant pressures, forcing us to reassess programs and adapt to shifting priorities in the sport system. Rising costs and new national policy requirements added to these demands, yet the year was also defined by inspiring international performances, strong domestic participation, and the resilience of our community.

One of the most significant impacts of the funding cuts was the difficult decision to abolish the Junior National Coach position, a role that had played a vital part in athlete development. Despite this loss, we were fortunate to maintain the senior recurve program leadership of Ron van der Hoff through the end of the fiscal year, during which he provided critical guidance for our high-performance programs. We are currently executing on a new high performance coach development plan both in our NCCP Programming and through the High Performance program and have contracted Linda Price to help in the leadership on the Para Archery programs and interim in Recurve teams.

Amid these challenges, Canadian athletes delivered inspiring results. We celebrated strong Olympic and Paralympic performances from Eric Peters, Virginie Chénier, and Kyle Tremblay, reaffirming Canada's competitiveness internationally. Their accomplishments demonstrate that even amidst structural and financial hurdles, Canadian archers remain highly competitive internationally. On home soil, the 2024 World Archery Field Championships in Lac la Biche brought medals for Canadians, highlighted by medal positions for Anya Pinel (ON) and Dustin Watson (ON); Jovica Djukic (SK), Andrew Fagan (ON), and Brian Maxwell (BC); and Amelia Gagne (ON) with Team Bronze medals and an individual Silver medal respectively. Congratulations to all athletes and to host Lakeland Archers for staging such a successful event.

Domestically, participation and growth remained strong. The sport system itself continued to evolve with the transfer of Safe Sport oversight from SDRCC to CCES and new application processes and requirements published by Sport Canada. These transitions required careful planning, policy changes, bylaw work and additional resources during an already difficult financial period. A national meeting of Provincial and Territorial members in May 2024 helped identify priorities for grassroots development, including the redevelopment of a program to replace Canbow, which remains a focus in the year ahead.

### Executive Director Report

The Canada Cups in Caledon and Winnipeg, and the Nationals in Fredericton, drew excellent attendance, while Mailmatch and Regional Indoor Championships neared record numbers. The growth of ASA Archery across Canada and the introduction of the inaugural ASA Indoor Canadian Championships have been well received and will continue to expand. The Fall of 2025 will see the development of new Range Safety Officer course delivery and work on the rules for 3D in the year ahead and further development in hosting of national events.

Partnerships remained vital to our success, with valued support from ParticipACTION, Vortex Canada, Canada Archery Online, BigShot/Delta McKenzie, Heartland Archery, and Jo Brooks Outdoors. We also extend gratitude to the Government of Canada, the Canadian Olympic Committee, the Canadian Paralympic Committee, and the Coaching Association of Canada for their continued investment in our sport.

Financially, the cancellation of revenue-generating programs, reduced sponsorships, and lower membership fees created strain, while rising costs added further pressure. Safe Sport remained a top priority: we launched a new educational video for event participants and reinforced the Rule of Two and True Sport principles across the system.

As we reflect on the year, we are proud of the progress made despite adversity. Our achievements were only possible through the dedication of staff, the leadership of our Board, and the tireless efforts of volunteers nationwide. To all who supported archery in Canada this year—thank you. Together, we continue to adapt, persevere, and build a stronger future for our sport.

## High Performance Program Report

Since the last report the HP program has seen a lot of success, but due to unforeseen circumstances and areas outside of Archery Canada's control, is expected to have a turbulent 2025 season.

Eric Peters and Kyle Tremblay both made their Olympic and Paralympic debuts, and had great performances and success at their Games. Eric finished the event in 9th place, tying the best finish a Canadian male has achieved at the Games. In his Paralympic debut, Kyle finished the Paralympic Games in sixth place, losing in a one arrow shoot off to advance.

Following Own the Podium funding recommendations, a strategy was created with a long-term focus, looking to focus on Next Generation talent, in both the athlete pools and coaching pools. The intent of the strategy was for Technical Leaders to work with a group of identified coaches, and bring them into the High Performance environment. Through direct mentorship, and hands-on experience, these coaches would work to help create Regional Training centers, where up and coming archery talent could turn to for coaching and direction towards achieving their goals.

Coaching development, especially high performance national level coaches, remains a gap for our Canadian Teams. The HP program is still committed to pursuing this strategy, and preparation towards Brisbane 2032. The strategy had to take a moment on the back burner, when technical leadership, Ron van der Hoff announced his departure from Archery Canada by the end of March 2025. As his departure occurred at the start of the season, it left a substantial gap in terms of technical leadership for the National Team, and the ability to implement the development strategy. To help prepare for the season and provide support to the NT athletes in 2025, Paralympic Head Coach, Linda Price, stepped in to act as National Coach designate.

Additionally, implementation of our HP strategy will be further delayed due to a delay in confirmation of Sport Canada funding for the next fiscal year (2025-2026). Without this funding confirmation, National Team athletes will have to cover the costs of event expenses up front in the upcoming competitive season.

It also leads to the inability to commit to projects and replacing the National coach, until the funding levels are confirmed. As a result the HP program, while ending the fiscal year with success at the Games, is set up for a potentially turbulent season and uncertainty.

Ending on a positive note, in April 2025 it was announced that the Compound Mixed Team will be added to the Olympic Roster for LA 2028. A strategy towards qualifying a team is in development, with both the board and leadership identifying a strong need to help secure further funding for the Compound Program, to ensure that the supports are in place to qualify a team for the Games. This includes looking to include Compound athletes into the Sport Canada AAP program for the 2026-2027 cycle.

# Development Committee Report

The Development Committee currently consists of four sub-committees, variably occupied based on the imperatives of the moment. This year featured major changes in sub-committee makeup, with chairmanship of three sub-committees being handed off to new incumbents. We welcomed the nomination of Sonia Schina as chair of the Events sub-committee, Michael Onaschuk to the Judging sub-committee, and Laura-Lynne Churchill replacing Randall Jones at Rules.

### **Coaching Sub-Committee**

The major challenge undertaken by the members of this sub-committee has been to review in depth the material currently used to develop intermediate-level coaches. This entailed carefully reconsidering the curriculum used in both the Instructor of Intermediate Archers and Introduction to Competition manuals. It became apparent that there was an overlap of roughly 85% of similar material; additionally, the fact that there was no significant demand for the Intro to Competition module highlighted an inefficiency in the system.

The sub-committee members have undertaken the task of melding and updating the information contained in both modules, distilling and upgrading the instruction to create this next step in the coaching pathway. With the introduction of the new Community Stream and increased technical focus provided by the revamped Instructor of Beginner Archers, the stage was set for the development of an appropriately upgraded and technically challenging intermediate level.

Progress on the new module has been slow but preliminary drafts of most chapters are completed. This single undertaking marshals the majority of sub-committee time and meetings, and will continue to do so for the foreseeable future, as it strives to prepare coaches for serious competition, this new level, as intimated at the last AGM, focusing "even more so on this aspect of sport delivery, building incrementally".

#### **Events Sub-Committee**

Despite the hardships caused by the airline strike, the wrap-up on the Wold Junior Championships remains positive, with exit feedback generally expressing satisfaction.

Drawing on this experience, as well as that of the successful World Field Championships, focus

remains on identifying similar opportunities for Canada to host high-level competition.

This not only strengthens the banner of the Archery Canada brand but makes the whole experience much more accessible to a greater number of Canadian athletes.

At home, the sub-committee ensured that any assistance required by the organizers of the other flagship events (the Canada Cup East and West) was provided in a timely fashion. These events are now solidly entrenched in the Canadian summer calendar and show the potential to grow in popularity, with record numbers recorded at this year's events. The sub-committee is still in the process of reviewing a new hosting model for these events that will align with the Archery Canada decision to become the major stakeholder involved in the running of these competitions.

Much discussion and work went into finalizing the Canada Winter Games Technical Package, particularly as the quota allocation had been modified and required additional consideration in identifying the most beneficial athlete quota and bow-style discipline for archery.

The Domestic program was off to a slow start but picked up somewhat, although discussions are ongoing with the Archery Canada 3D Committee regarding the integration of the ASA model into the domestic calendar. Other domestic initiatives overseen by the sub-committee have been reported in detail by the Executive Director at regular intervals in thorough reports presented at the Members Council meetings.

The sub-committee members were saddened to hear of the passing of Bill Embry, a long-time collaborator and volunteer, and recognized his long-standing service to the archery community as DOS at so many of our events.

#### **Rules Sub-Committee**

This sub-committee was most active up-to and including to the very onset of the Canada Cups, with rules modifications coming into effect in time to allow their being applied at these events to the benefit of all archers.

A major challenge remains to keep the rule book up-to-date with all World Archery modifications as it is increasingly difficult to match release of major changes with scheduled publication of our own rule book. The sub-committee is addressing this problem and is responding for the moment by releasing updates on an ad hoc basis until such time as a more regular means of providing the required updates can be worked out.

### **Judging Sub-Committee**

It bears repeating that, the Judging sub-committee has been working very closely with the Rules sub-committee throughout the year as rule-related questions were routinely routed to Archery Canada for adjudication. These committees work hand in hand in proposing resolutions to contested rulings and/or implementation of current rules.

The training and certification of judges remains one of the major areas of concern for this sub-committee, which reviewed current National Judge candidates and discussed a National Judge reaccreditation process to guarantee maintenance of the highest standards of quality on the part of Canadian judges. This also entails development of various judges' resource materials to assist in tournament reporting. Such forms and checklists assist in assessing judge and competition standards from event to event in a similar fashion, thus providing important baseline information against which to assess performance at future events.

Finally, judge selection meetings were held at various times to identify the contingent of Canadian judges chosen to officiate at both domestic and international events.

All sub-committees owe a debt of gratitude to the dedicated Archery Canada staff that ceaselessly provide the coordination and materials required to keep meetings and discussions moving along. Without the invaluable assistance of Karl Balisch, Kylah Cawley and Priyanka Dhanie, the sub-committee volunteers would find it much more difficult to provide guidance in their respective areas of responsibility.

## Governance Committee Report

It has been a busy year in Governance, abet behind the scenes as it should be in keeping AC current and operating with the best tool to work with.

### **Summary and Key Observations**

### 1. Consultation & Compliance Activities

The committee has invested significant effort in consultation activities, particularly with Sport Canada and Sport Law and Safe Sport. Such collaboration is essential for staying updated with the current expectations and requirements in Safe Sport. This proactive approach helps ensure that Archery Canada operates in alignment with best practices and regulatory obligations.

### 2. Bylaw Updates

- The update and revision of Archery Canada's bylaws mark a significant achievement. Moving these updates forward for membership acceptance demonstrates good governance and a commitment to inclusivity.
- Posting the accepted bylaws on the Archery Canada webpage allows members to review operational parameters.

### 3. Policy Review and Implementation

- Term Limits: The committee is actively reviewing term limits for both Committee and Board members. Phasing in these updates as tenures expire is a balanced approach, offering continuity while gradually implementing best practices.
- Risk Management, Equity, and Inclusion: These policy areas remain under ongoing review. This continuous process is appropriate given the evolving landscape of sport governance and the dynamic external environment.

### 4. Forward-Looking Approach

The committee's recognition that external issues in the archery world often drive policy updates is prudent. This demonstrates a commitment to agility and responsiveness, preparing Archery Canada to adapt quickly to changes and new challenges.

#### **Recommendations**

- Documentation: Ensure that the specific outcomes or changes from policy reviews (Risk Management, Equity, Inclusion) are clearly documented and communicated to stakeholders.
- Stakeholder Engagement: Consider regular updates to the membership regarding governance changes, not just at annual voting periods.
- Monitoring & Evaluation: Implement a schedule to revisit new policies and bylaws to assess effectiveness and identify areas needing further improvement.

### Commendations

- The committee's behind-the-scenes efforts have yielded concrete governance improvements.
- Their emphasis on consultation and compliance with Safe Sport requirements is aligned with national priorities.
- The phased approach to implementing term limits respects current service while enhancing governance for the future.

### **General Comments**

2024/2025 was another strong year of growth for Archery in the province of Saskatchewan. The SAA saw over 5% increase in overall memberships, and a substantial increase in Coaches. The SAA was proud to provide our member clubs with additional funding and numerous funded opportunities for youth archers.

### Accomplishments/Highlights from 2024-2025

- JOP Championships saw record number of athletes at 430.
- Indoor Target Provincials seen growth with 296 Athletes competing.
- Outdoor 3D Champs (87), Indoor 3D Champs (94), Outdoor Field Provs (59) all had strong attendance.
- SAA Open (Matchplay and Mixed Teams) debuted this summer and was very well reviewed by the athletes involved.
- Supported youth attending Rocky Mountain Classic, Can West Youth Cup, Seminars and more.
